## MEET GUEST AUTHOR LINDA JOY SINGLETON

Last October, I strolled through the GreatValley Bookfest in Manteca to see if there were any local or regional children's authors we might consider for a speaking engagement for the



eight- to 12-year old set. The bookfest was amazing (see page 6) and that's where I met our June 1 guest author, Linda Joy Singleton. Linda has published over 25 books for middlegrade and young adult readers.

Her career path began with her love of reading. Her childhood 100book collection of girls series books like Nancy Drew, Judy Bolton and Trixie Belden led grew into an adult

passion. Today, thousands of juvenile series books fill her home library. At age 13 Linda sent a fan letter to Margaret Sutton, author of the Judy Bolton mystery series. That fan letter led to a friendship with Margaret and later a collaboration on a Judy Bolton mystery, which they cowrote.

When Linda was 14, she wrote down a goal: To write a book series of her own. Today she encourages children to follow their dreams and add in hard work and determination. Linda also shares that there is no magic age at which to begin a writing career. Linda wrote constantly as a teenager. She submitted stories to teen magazines. Nothing sold for years, but she admits it was a great learning experience.

Linda now lives on a farm in Burson, about 25 miles east of Lodi. It is there she often finds inspiration for her books from her farm animals. She especially loves cats. The first book of the *Curious Cat Spy Club* series features youngsters who rescue kittens and form a club to help animals through volunteering and solving animal mysteries.

On her website, Linda lists "Ten Things You Probably Didn't Know About Me" including this tidbit: She was bitten by a fish while on a Caribbean cruise and then put the scene in a book. You just never know what will inspire you!

## Calling all 8- to 12-year-old would-be authors!

Youngsters and tweens are invited to hear Northern California author Linda Joy Singleton speak on Saturday, June 1, 11:15 a.m. at the Modesto Library Auditorium.

Ms. Singleton, the author of numerous children's chapter books, began her writing journey at the age of eight. Her visit to Modesto will provide youngsters with ideas on how to improve their writing, remember their childhood, and what to write about (hint: her animals give her lots of ideas for books).

Ms. Singleton's books include *The Curious Cat Spy Club series, A Cat Is Better,* and *Lucy Loves Goosey*. She also has a picture book, *Crane and Crane* coming out this year.

## Say Hello! to Michele Machado from the Children's Department



With the Summer Reading Challenge just around the corner, we talked with Children's Department staffer Michele Machado.

## Michele, when did you start work at the library?

I started working for the Stanislaus County Library system in 2006 as a page in Keyes. I remember my mom telling me that the library was hiring after she saw the posting in a newspaper announcement. At the time I was going to California State University Stanislaus and with the Keyes Community Library just down the road, it seemed like a perfect opportunity. I grew up going to the Oakdale Community Library and remember thinking it would be the perfect place to work. I was right, but I had no idea back then the impact libraries have on their communities. Libraries are simply amazing.

I worked as a page in various locations for a few years and slowly applied and got promoted to other positions in the organization until I was hired in a full-time position in the Modesto Library Children's and Teen Services Department.

#### What is your job title?

My current job title is Children's Librarian Trainee. However, in May I will graduate with a Master of Library and Information Science degree from San José State University's School of Information and be promoted to Children's Librarian. I am so excited!

## How does your job interface with other positions at the Library?

For libraries to serve their communities and start conversations and partnerships, internal collaboration is key. Not only do I work with the wonderful and creative people in my department, but I also join forces with others to share opportunities and bring ideas into reality. I am a part of various committees, with members from all over our community libraries, whose aim is to provide innovative and engaging programming across the board.

#### What do you enjoy about your position?

The thing I love most about my job is that I can be me. I can be creative and goofy. I can be silly and ridiculous. And yet, I can also be heard and appreciated for the things that I do well. I am able to present important findings and express ideas to a group of people who are just as passionate about their jobs as I am. My strengths are recognized, and my worth is known and for that I am grateful.

# What are some things you would like people to know about children's programs at our library?

The programs that we offer in our library are created and implemented with our communities in mind. We listen and we actively try to create programming that meets their needs. We also love interacting with our library "friends." Building relationships through shared interests, whether it be a unicorn craft event (where I am obviously wearing my unicorn onesie in the photo!), a DIY Kids STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) program, or a story time, is one of the most important things that we do, and one of our most favorite, too.

## What are a couple of programs you are proudest of?

I am generally just proud of my department and all the work we put in to making a lasting impact on all those who come to visit our library. I am also proud of the readers in our community who make the Summer Reading Challenge such a success each year. And as the coordinator of youth portion of this program, I am proud to help keep our youngest community members reading over the summer to avoid summer slide and to have fun as well!

In 2014, I started the All-Teens Craft Fair to allow those kids who aged out of the All-Kids Craft Fair a place to continue to showcase their excellence and it has been well received.

## A little about you... family? hobbies? home town? pets?

I was born and raised in Oakdale, California—Cowboy Capitol of the World!—and consider myself a country kid, having spent most of my time growing up at my grandparents' dairy. That upbringing has made me not afraid of a little dirt and hard work. I enjoy crafting and being creative in any way possible. I also love to read, drink coffee (sometimes at the same time), make people laugh, and spend time with the important people in my life.

Zip Books is a new service for customers to request books and audiobooks that are not currently in the Stanislaus County Library's catalog. The item is delivered to your home, free of charge, using Amazon Prime. After you've finished with the item, you just return it to the library.

To get started with Zip Books:

 Customers must have a valid Stanislaus County Library card in good standing (\$10 of fines or less) and a valid email address.

- Zip Books can only be requested one at a time. However, after the item is returned to the library, you may request another one.
- Zip Books will be mailed directly to your home in 2-3 days after approval. Items are on loan for 3 weeks. Item due date receipt included with delivery. Zip Books cannot be renewed.




### SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

It's Showtime at Your Library!

This year's Summer Reading Challenge theme should inspire all ages to pick up a reading log or review sheet and start reading May 21 at any of the Stanislaus County Libraries.

Tween and teen readers in the "Hour



Challenge" (recommended for readers ages 9 to 18) can mark off a square for each hour of reading, and may visit the library after seven hours of reading to be entered into a drawing for awesome prizes. Once a log is finished, readers will receive an additional entry into the prize drawing.

In the "30-minute Challenge" children mark off a circle on the log for each day they have read or been read to for at least 30 minutes. Participants earn a prize for every seven days of reading. The "30-minute Challenge" is suggested for readers up to age 8.




